Summit Outhouse Replacement

The outhouse at the summit has seen many hard years. This includes being turned over in our past issue with vandalism, and afterward being righted and returned to duty.

We have decided to replace it. This has begun with the construction of a new outhouse in the shop of Robbie Drasye in Tupper Lake, and is now nearly complete. In the spring it will be transported in sections to the summit. The job also includes dismantling and removal of the old outhouse, digging a new hole over which to place the new outhouse, and filling in the old hole. In addition to time and materials already invested, the contractor estimates that with trips and transport up and down the mountain, completion of the job this coming spring will require the labor of three men for at least three days. Needless to say, this project will be quite a bit more expensive than building an outhouse in your backvard.

FOMA has received a grant in the amount of \$250 from the Adirondack Foundation to be applied to construction of a new outhouse, for which we are most grateful. However, this grant is far short of what we expect this project to cost. But, we are confident that our good donors will come through for us on this.

In addition to our fire tower historical exhibits inside the cabin, my outdoor natural history education programs continued to educate our climbers about the flora and fauna on the mountain. My Dragonfly Education program continued as I would capture a large mosaic darner when they were flying on the summit and place it in a mesh sided cage so that folks could get up close and personal with it. The insect was always released unharmed at the end of the day. Many kids had their first opportunity to touch a dragonfly after climbing Mount Arab and numerous photos of kids "shaking hands" with large dragonflies were taken by parents.

NEWS FROM THE TOP

Summit Steward

I am pleased to announce that this year we entered into a mini grant collaboration with Northern New York Audubon Society supporting a Ruby Throated Hummingbird Ecology and Sanctuary Program atop the peak. Dozens of tiny hummingbirds jousted and flitted around the summit all summer into the fall migration at the six feeding stations we set up and maintained. I educated climbers on the interesting commensal relationship between springtime migratory Yellow Bellied Sapsucker Woodpeckers and male Ruby Throats, as well as highlighting the stunning migration of these tiny birds back and forth across the Gulf of Mexico to their winter homes in Central America. Many interested climbers received our Hummingbird 'business cards' highlighting an Audubon citizen science program called Hummingbirds at Home.

This year I initiated a bat sanctuary with input and help from Bat Conservation International atop Mount Arab. I mounted a Bat House on the side of the cabin and disseminated bat biology information to climbers. Unfortunately due to White Nose Syndrome our Adirondack Little and Big Brown Bat populations have plummeted in recent years and no bats were observed roosting this year atop Mount Arab. Our Little Brown Bat is actually being considered for endangered species status by the US Government. I plan on continuing and expanding this program next year and hopefully we will attract some bat residents to help control our burgeoning nocturnal Adirondack

mosquito populations. The mere presence of the bat house generated great interest in many climbers, especially among our youth who love bats!

This year I continued taking inventory of plant and animal populations on the summit and along the trail. My records show that we have an amazing diversity of life on our mountain and our porch front Nature Center generated many nature related guestions which I was pleased to answer. My thanks to artist Roger Hall who kindly donated many of the art prints illustrating Adirondack natural history which are displayed in the center.

Other new developments on our mountain which I publicized included our new Friends of Mt. Arab Facebook page (page 1) and the continuing great work by the Adirondack Mountain Club trail crews which make the climb easier. I look forward to returning to Mt. Arab next year to continue this wonderful job.

My family has owned property in the Mount Arab lake community for 47 years and I've hiked the mountain mv entire life. But what an incredible privilege it was to serve as one of our summit stewards again this season! As a former Naval Officer. I've had the opportunity to do a lot of interesting things. but my summer on the mountain was again one of the highlights. Rain or shine, we truly are blessed with an amazing resource at Mount Arab: arguably

the most family-friendly summit hike in all of the Adirondacks. Where else can you find ample parking and a well-maintained, moderate trail all leading up to such a spectacular view? And the work that has been done to restore the tower and observer's cabin really shows.

It's no wonder that many guide books list Mt. Arab first on their lists of suggested hikes in the Adirondacks! We are stewards of a very special resource: a mountain that people of all ages and abilities can enjoy. It's often the very first mountain that people ever hike. And whether that hiker's age is three or eighty-three, hiking Mount Arab plants a seed. It gives them the desire to hike more, and to invest more time and resources into our region. One of the most stunning examples is teenage schoolchildren who live within the Adirondacks, but have never hiked up a

mountain. When they reach the summit of our mountain and take in the views around them, it gives them a deeply profound appreciation for the rich resources in their own backyard. The impact of that realization can't be measured. I also talk to many tourists who are visiting our area for the first time, but make the decision to come back in the years ahead after experiencing a hike up Mount Arab. And hence, the work we are doing is accomplishing so much more than just helping to maintain one mountain's heritage. Mount Arab has become a priceless educational resource and economic catalyst for the entire region. When we contribute to supporting Mount Arab, we are advancing the Adirondacks as a whole.

I began hiking the trail up Mount Arab long before FOMA was formed. I know what the trail and summit looked like before FOMA. And I know what it looks like now. There has been a dramatic improvement in the trail, tower, and cabin with far less littering and destruction to the environment. When people see that something is well-cared for, they tend to be more careful and respectful in turn. Good stewardship begets good stewardship. We need FOMA to keep doing this important work. and the contributions from our supporters have helped to make it all possible. We have some important work coming up next year. Our summit outhouse, which gets used extensively by all those school groups and boy scouts, will be replaced. Like your house, our structures always need maintenance of some kind. Imagine the effort if your house was on the summit of a mountain in the Adirondacks. It's amazing that everything holds up as well as it does! But I can assure you that our work on Mount Arab is well worth it. I look forward to many years of helping to preserve this amazing resource.

2014 Trail Improvements

The Adirondack Mountain Club (ADK) professional trail crew continued the trail work they started in 2012 and expanded on during the summer of 2013.

On Saturday, May 5th, 2014 the Adirondack Mountain Club held a training day on the Mt. Arab trail. Following that, the ADK professional trail crew spent three weeks on our mountain building a stone staircase in an eroded gulley that had become unsafe for hikers. From week to week the team varied in size, but had between 4 and 7 people each week. They did a great job and our summit stewards continue to receive praise for the excellent condition of the trail.

REPAIRS PLANNED FOR 2015

This is going to read much like last year's projection. A few of the steel diagonals in the tower frame are showing signs of corrosion, some of the bolts need replacing, and the cement footers at the tower base need to be repaired.

David Vana, a specialist in fire tower construction and repair from Bloomingdale, NY, had planned to start this project in the spring of 2013. Unfortunately, ankle surgery has kept him off our mountain all summer and fall. David has had extensive experience with towers identical to the tower on Mount Arab. We really need his services because he can repair or fabricate replacement parts for any part of the structure. So, FOMA has postponed this expensive work (donations anyone?) until spring 2015. This will involve repairs to the tower foundation, a bit of steel work, and window repairs in both the tower and cabin.

HISTORY of the FRIENDS of MOUNT ARAB (FOMA)

On Earth Day 1997 a small group of citizens and DEC officials gathered at the summit of Mount Arab. With the common desire to save and to share this historical facility and its magnificent views with future generations, they resolved to restore and maintain the sadly decaying fire tower and fire observer's cabin located there.

Beginning with incorporation as a non-profit in partnership with DEC, FOMA has progressed steadily towards its goal. While there has been continuing outstanding trail work performed by the ADK trail crew, staffing and ongoing restoration of summit facilities proceeds with the essential support of YOU, our donors.
