We now have a new Summit Outhouse

The summit outhouse had seen many hard years. This included being knocked over in our past issue with vandalism, after which it was returned to duty.

FOMA received \$500 from the McLanahan Family Fund plus an additional \$290, both from the Adirondack Foundation, which along with other donations made this project possible. We are most grateful for this financial help. We expect that those of you who climb our mountain will appreciate it even more. The new outhouse is 5-star quality.

Tower Footer Replacement

This work was done under contract with David Vana, a professional from Bloomingdale, NY who has long experience with all aspects of fire tower repair and reconstruction having done this sort of work all over the US. The work was expensive (close to \$18,000), but as we have discovered as the work proceeded, the old anchor bolts were **extremely** corroded. Note in photo to the right the two pieces in the center. The first twisted off upon turning the nut and the second was corroded smaller yet. The new bolts set into the bedrock with epoxy are stainless steel so should hold our tower securely in place far into the future.

Rounding out our 2015 projects, a cabin window on the west side near the back has been replaced by Jeremy Graton, Tupper Lake. It was discovered that the sill was badly rotted from years of exposure to the prevailing weather. Now that all the windows are protected by solid wood shutters the new window should fare better.

Back to the BIG ONE - tower footer replacement

With DEC assistance, he and his crew were finally able to haul all his equipment and supplies to the summit this past September. As can be seen here, a considerable quantity of supplies and equipment had to be hauled to the top of the mountain, and then hauled back down when the job was complete. After a bit of DEC trail modification, ATVs supplied and driven by DEC personnel did the hauling. Rain barrels loaned by the WildCenter and placed beforehand supplied water.
