NEWS FROM THE TOP

Greetings and Happy Holiday Season. Yet another year has passed in my life as the Summit Steward of

Arab Mountain in Piercefield, NY. This truly was a groundbreaking year, reopening after being closed during 2020, the first year of the COVID Pandemic.

In this second year of a continuing pandemic many practices were implemented to minimize exposure to the continuing virus threat. The Museum was closed to inside traffic while open windows and doors allowed visitors to view exhibits from a distance. I moved many displays outside on a daily basis, my dogs stayed home, social distancing was encouraged, and masks were encouraged on rainy days when people congregated on the porch.

By my estimate numbers of climbers continued to increase this year with many people clinging to the solace of nature to help dispel the COVID blues. I continued to help maintain our summit facility in great shape with an immaculate outhouse, and virtually no graffiti on our structures. I greeted and chatted with visitors on the cabin porch each day and there was plenty of enthusiasm in evidence as I spent countless hours explaining the natural and human history of this section of the world. Despite the ever increasing deterioration of our worldwide biomes our Adirondack niche in northern New York State shows little ill effects and is a bastion of beauty in a world beset by diseases, wildfires, floods, tornadoes, hurricanes, blizzards, and other disasters. That is part of the reason I live nearby Arab Mountain year round.

Once more we have two comfortable benches overlooking distant mountain vistas, a freshly painted fire tower, roof repairs, brand new tower cab windows that self latch upon opening. I maintain an immaculate trail and summit with much help from the climbers who collectively demonstrate strong environmental ethics. In addition Dr. P. Erickson continued his meticulous craftsmanship replacing gutters and handrails. Mr. J. Debes also continued assisting us with maintenance such as painting and kiosk repairs.

Again, I had a great Spring, Summer, and Autumn serving as your Summit Steward and look forward to returning in the summer of 2022.

Trail Improvements

The 'Tupper Triad Challenge', which includes a climb to the summit of Mount Arab in addition to climbing Coney and Goodman mountains, was held 9 October.

Cabin Repairs and other Maintenance

Peter Erickson completed a number of repairs on the observer's cabin including replacing the handrails by the steps to the porch, some minor siding repair, and a repair of the rain gutter.

Sheila Young painted the entire interior of the tower cab.

Jeff Debes who tends the FOMA website has also cleaned up and painted over much graffiti on the tower, cabin, and trailhead kiosk. He has also handled some maintenance on the kiosk.

'Lighting the Tower' and a Tsunami

Tower Windows – Automatic Latches

FOMA discovered a problem with the tower windows that became apparent early in the summer. Windy days caused any opened windows to slam back and forth. Self-engaging latches were designed, constructed, and installed on the windows. This fix solved the problem. Volunteer work was performed by Dick Bentley and Larry Lee
